

Padmashri Nana Patekar Inaugurates AIU's 39th Inter-University Central Zone Youth Festival at MGM University

Veteran actor urges students to embrace struggle, self-reflection, and sincere artistry

META AIU's 39th Inter-University Central Zone Youth Festival was inaugurated with grandeur at MGM University, marked by the inspiring presence of Padma Shri Nana Patekar. The ceremony, held amidst the traditional Gondhal performance and Deep Prajwalan, brought together over 1,100 students from 24 universities across Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Marathwada, and Vidarbha.

In his keynote address, Nana Patekar urged the youth to approach every art form with honesty and dedication, reminding them that true revolutions often begin on the stage. "Rangmanch aasan nahi, yahi se kranti shuru hoti hai," he said, calling on students to perform with sincerity

rather than for applause. Reflecting on his five-decade journey in cinema and theatre, the veteran actor shared personal stories of hardship and learning, emphasizing self-awareness as the foundation of growth. "Know your weaknesses, once you understand them, life becomes easier," he advised. He encouraged students not to chase excessive material gains and to allow


their craft not validation to define them.

In his remarks, Dr. Sapkal welcomed students from all participating states, highlighting the role of sports, research, and culture in holistic education. The inaugural ceremony was attended by Vice President of the MGM Trust Dr. P. M. Jadhav, Trustee Bausaheb Rajale, MGM University Vice Chancellor

Dr. Vilas Sapkal, Registrar Dr. Ashish Gadekar, AIU officials Dr. Nirmal Jaura and Deepak Kumar Jha, Festival Organising Secretary Dr. Shiv Kadam, along with all deans, HODs, principals, and several dignitaries.

Dr. Nirmal Jaura described the event as a platform that connects youth to India's cultural identity. "Here, you will either win or learn, both are equally valuable," he said. The youth festival will feature competitions across five major art categories over the course of five days. The ceremony also included tributes to veteran actor Dharmendra and JNEC professor Sunil Kumar Jaiswal.

The inaugural event set an energetic tone for the festival, blending tradition, inspiration, and artistic excellence under one vibrant cultural umbrella.



Art with Purpose, Not Applause

- Nana urged the youth to perform with sincerity, not to chase praise or perfection: "*Don't perform just to say you participated. Live that kalakar.*"
- Sharing memories from Prahar, he spoke about living with the Indian Army for three years, an experience that changed how he saw discipline, courage and sacrifice.
- He also warned against accumulating more than one needs: "*Excess destroys us. Keep your life simple.*"
